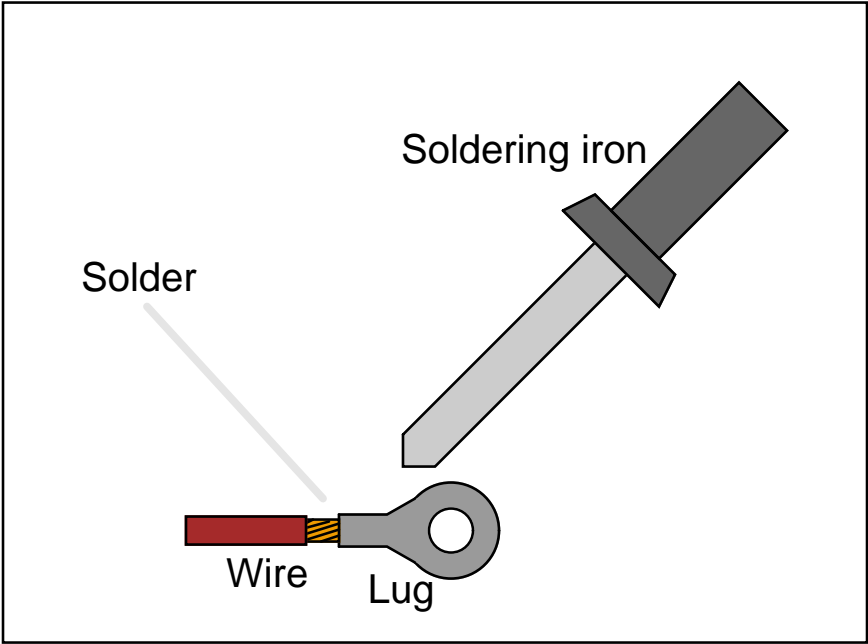
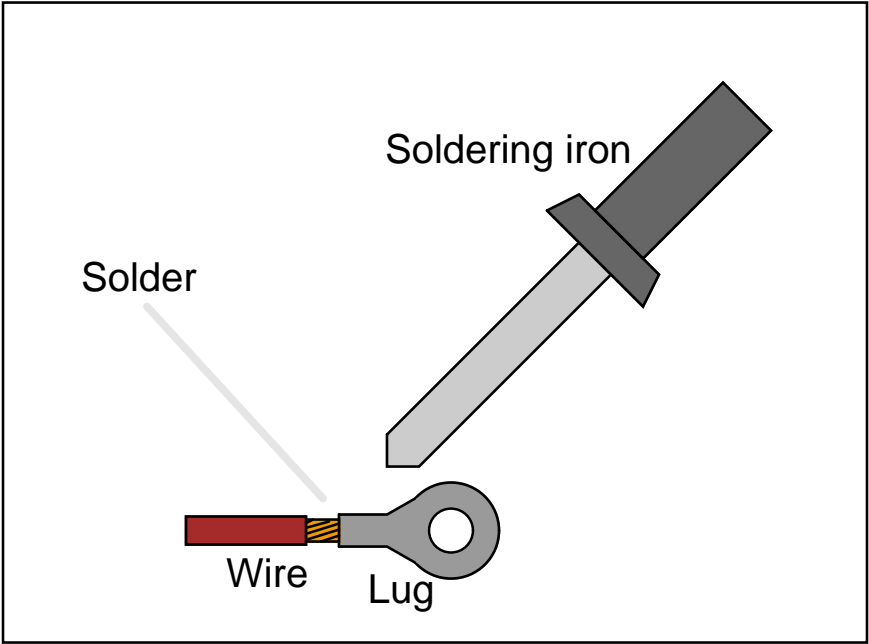


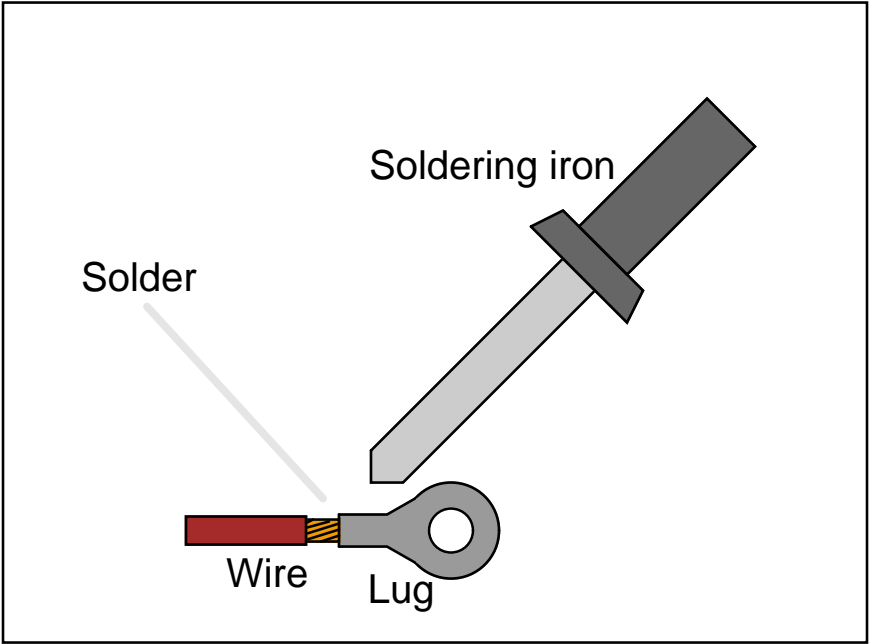
Animation: Soldering a wire to a lug

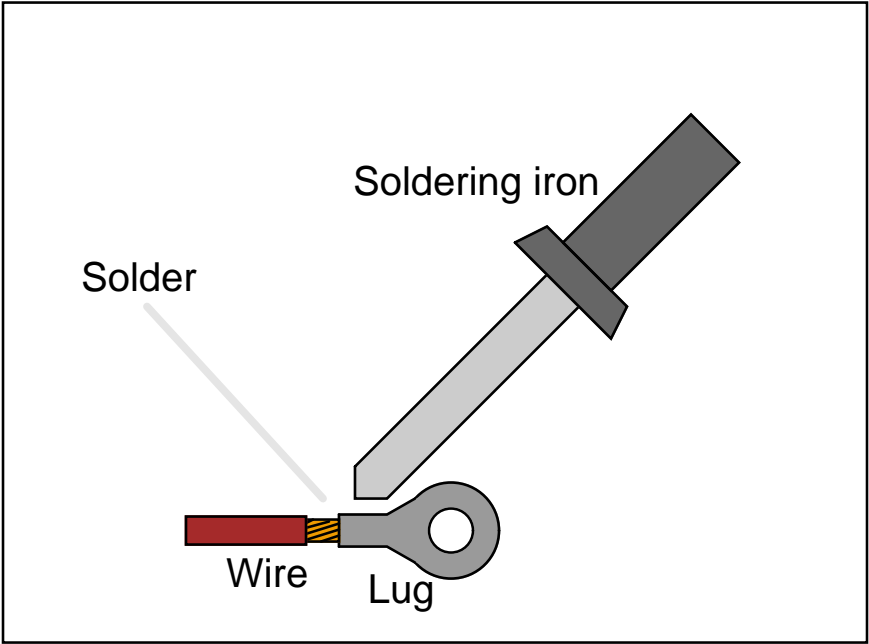
